Key Topic/Step 1: Dressing appropriately

This might be how you normally dress, but it is not proper for winter. You should always have full length pants and at least a sweatshirt but preferably a jacket.

Like this? No try again. Is this better? Much better.

Key Topic/Step 2: Survival kit for vehicle

What are the other things you said I should keep in my vehicle?

I said you should keep a winter survival kit in your vehicle.

What should I keep in this winter survival kit?

Let me lay it out for you.

In the picture shown is a few of the items we had available to us which consists of a plastic container with a lid, non-perishable food items, a red bandana or cloth, a small candle and matches, a pen or pencil and paper, and an emergency blanket, all of this should fit inside of the plastic container.

This is a list of the items we didn't have available to us at the time such as, a 30 foot cord to use as homing like when exiting the vehicle, booster cables, basic tools, cat litter, sand or other grit stored in a plastic container, a shovel, tow cables or blankets, road flares or reflectors, a snow suit and heavy boots, a plastic flashlight and spare batteries, a cell phone adapter to plug into lighter, a whistle, safety pins and a large plastic garbage bag.
